## Grand Knight's Corner

I came across a quote the other day that started me on the path to this article. The quote from Hubert Humphrey states, "Just be what you are and speak from your guts and your heart. It is all a man has."

That quote got me thinking about how powerful the human voice is and what a gift it is from our creator. I have and I'm sure many of you have as well personally witnessed in our own families the effect of that gift. I have seen my children tense up and sometimes cry when I've spoken harshly even worse when they gave me no cause. At the same time I've used my voice to console when they had a bad day or express how proud and happy they make me, and seen them light up from within even today as young adults. That same cause and effect holds true for us and our creator, God may not verbally chastise or console us choosing instead to use scripture but make no mistake scripture does provide wisdom in the use of our voice. If we as God's creations use it poorly do we not feel shame and embarrassment? I know I do and I can truthfully acknowledge that I have used that gift poorly at times. Yet when I raise my voice to God in prayer or even in song I sometimes feel like the day is a little brighter.

I started looking through my bible at home for scripture regarding the use of voice and came across quite a few passages nearly as many as there are about money and debt. The following are from the books of James and the Letter to the Ephesians.

**James Chapter 3 Verses 7-10,** *"For every kind of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no human being can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. This need not be so, my brothers."* **Ephesians Chapter 4 Verses 30-32,** *"No foul language should come out of your mouths, but only such as is good for needed edification, that it may impart grace to those who hear. And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with which you were sealed for the day of redemption. All bitterness, fury, anger, shouting, and reviling must be removed from you, along with all malice and be kind to one another, compassionate, forgiving one another as God has forgiven you in Christ."*

One of the warnings I use to give my children to try and get them to think before speaking was to remember that words once uttered can never be taken back. Especially now with social media recording our very thoughts, images and commentaries and telecom companies recording our conversations and I think those cautions are even more prevalent. Words can heal or hurt today on unprecedented levels, so to exercise that voice properly they must be chosen carefully. Words hold power and I think we tend to forget that in the heat of the moment. I have even run into cautions about using your voice in my Stoic readings. Two in particular are favorites of mine and come from the writings of **Epictetus.** The first is *"We have two ears and one mouth so that we can listen twice as much as we speak."* The second is *"Keep silence for the most part,*

## MOTHER'S DAY

Mother's Day in the United States is annually held on the second Sunday of May. It celebrates motherhood and it is a time to appreciate mothers and mother figures. Many people give gifts, cards, flowers, candy, a meal in a restaurant or other treats to their mother and mother figures, including grandmothers, great-grandmothers, stepmothers, and foster mothers.

The origins of Mother's Day are attributed to different people. Many believe that two women, Julia Ward Howe and Anna Jarvis were important in establishing the tradition of Mother's Day in the United States. Other sources say that Juliet Calhoun Blakely initiated Mother's Day in Albion, Michigan, in the late 1800s. Her sons paid tribute to her each year and urged others to honor their mothers.

Around 1870, Julia Ward Howe called for Mother's Day to be celebrated each year to encourage pacifism and disarmament amongst women. It continued to be held in Boston for about ten years under her sponsorship, but died out after that.

In 1907, Anna Jarvis held a private Mother's Day celebration in memory of her mother, Ann Jarvis, in Grafton, West Virginia. Ann Jarvis had organized "Mother's Day Work Clubs" to improve health and cleanliness in the area where she lived. Anna Jarvis launched a quest for Mother's Day to be more widely recognized. Her campaign was later financially supported by John Wanamaker, a clothing merchant from Philadelphia.

In 1908, she was instrumental in arranging a service in the Andrew's Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton, West Virginia, which was attended by 407 children and their mothers. The church has now become the International Mother's Day Shrine. It is a tribute to all mothers and has been designated as a National Historic Landmark.

Mother's Day has become a day that focuses on generally recognizing mothers' and mother figures' roles. Mother's Day has also become an increasingly important event for businesses in recent years. This is particularly true of restaurants and businesses manufacturing and selling cards and gift items.

## MEMORIAL DAY

On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day of remembrance later that month. "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed.

The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle.

On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers buried there.

Many Northern states held similar commemorative events and reprised the tradition in subsequent years; by 1890 each one had made Decoration Day an official state holiday. Southern states, on the other hand, continued to honor their dead on separate days until after World War I.

Memorial Day, as Decoration Day gradually came to be known, originally honored only those lost while fighting in the Civil War. But during World War I the United States found itself embroiled in another major conflict, and the holiday evolved to commemorate American military personnel who died in all wars.

For decades, Memorial Day continued to be observed on May 30, the date Logan had selected for the first Decoration Day. But in 1968 Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which established Memorial Day as the last Monday in May in order to create a three-day weekend for federal employees; the change went into effect in 1971. The same law also declared Memorial Day a federal holiday.

Cities and towns across the United States host Memorial Day parades each year, often incorporating military personnel and members of veterans' organizations. Some of the largest parades take place in Chicago, New York and Washington, D.C.

Americans also observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries and memorials. On a less somber note, many people take weekend trips or throw parties and barbecues on the holiday, perhaps because it unofficially marks the beginning of summer.
